# **PURPOSE**

This study explored how autistic individuals and their parents talked about their information needs.

A crucial guiding question was:

"What does it mean to give autistic people the information they want, rather than the information others think they need?"

# **TAKEAWAYS**

Information systems should be designed around the needs of their users, but in practice this means that they are typically designed for a particular type of "average" user. This often excludes autistic and other neurodiverse individuals.

This forces those users to navigate around the systems' inflexible and inaccessible nature. This has serious consequences for marginalized individuals. Their personal safety and independence rely on navigating these systems effectively.

This study demonstrates that creators of information systems need to think more critically about the needs of **all** of their users.

# RESULTS

## Autistic Individuals:

- saw themselves as active
   seekers of information
- displayed high levels of motivation and critical evaluation skills
- had clear preferences about how they engaged with information.

### **Important Factors:**

- modality how information is delivered
- **format** how information is presented
- readability

### Strong Preferences:

- Manageable, structured
   information environments
   that gave them the most
   control over their
   information-seeking
- Interacting with information via social media and online environments
